

How many of us like being told what to do? I guess not many! Often as children we are given instructions, and quite often we resent them, but usually these are given for our own benefit. And so it is in life, instructions are usually given for the greater good of everyone around.

The Bible is, as we know, full of instructions. Instructions on how to live our lives, how to treat others, how to pray, how to share the Gospel, how to behave towards those who treat you badly, how to love one another... the list goes on.

Many of you will be familiar with the story of the wedding at Cana in John 2. Jesus was at a wedding when they ran out of wine. This was a real social faux-pas for the host. Mary tells Jesus what has happened and Jesus steps in. He gives the servants instructions to fill the wine jars with water and then take some and serve it to the master. When the master tastes it, he is astonished to discover that the water has been turned into the best wine they've ever tasted.

When we look at this story we often think of the miracle of turning the water into wine. But in order for that to happen, something else had to happen first. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water"; so they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet." They did so. ~ John 2:7-8

Jesus told the servants to fill the wine jars with water and to serve it to their master. He gave them an instruction. To the servants this instruction would have made no sense at all. Firstly, these jars were reserved for good wine. Secondly, serving water to their master in front of his guests was bound to get them into trouble!

But notice those last 3 words of verse 8 - **they did so**. For this miracle to take place at all, someone first had to fill the jars with water. That's actually really important! For Jesus to perform the miracle, someone had to do the ground work first. From a seemingly useless task a great miracle took place.

I hope this is an encouragement for you. Sometimes we may feel like God is prompting us to carry out a seemingly worthless or uncomfortable task. But if we are faithful and carry out His simple instructions, it is then that

He can perform miracles and transform lives. Often God's instructions may make little or no sense to us. But God can achieve great things in those quiet steps of obedience.

So trust Him even when the outcome seems unclear. Obey Him even in the simple things. The wine that had been transformed from water was the best they'd ever had. God wants the best for each one of us. He's working on something far greater and far better than we can ever imagine. Remember, before the water turned into wine, someone filled the jars.

May we all be blessed with servant hearts so that we can see God's miraculous work and lives transformed. Which jars does God want you to fill?

Somayeh from IRAN



It started with one aim: to prove that Christianity wasn't true and Islam was. So when a Christian friend in Iran invited Somayeh* to church, she decided to go.

"My only goal was to challenge and disprove everything I'd heard," she says. God, though, had other ideas. And when she entered the church, everything changed. "The presence of God was overwhelming," she says. "It was everything I had longed to feel in my prayers but never did."

Somayeh opened her heart to Jesus. "When I walked out of the church, I felt like a bird released from a cage," she says. "As I prayed and learned, I grew in my faith and got to know Him. Through prayer, discipleship and the Holy Spirit, my new life truly began."

The Cost Of Discipleship

Somayeh's new life came at a cost. When her husband discovered her faith, he was furious. A violent, abusive man, he beat her and treated her cruelly. "He found my Bible and tore it up in front of me," she recalls. "Another time, he ripped up my birth certificate. It was as if my identity was torn apart. I cried so much that day."

God brought comfort: "In the midst of those tears, I heard a voice say, 'Your name is written in the Book of Life,' and those words gave me strength to carry on," she says. She could only risk going to church once a month, and relied upon recorded sermons. Somayeh was questioned by the secret police, but they didn't find anything. And in the background, there was always her husband. "My husband had threatened to kill me if I preached the gospel," she says.

"But I couldn't stay silent." Finally, he took drastic action. He moved the family to another city, cutting her ties with her Christian community.

The Impossible Church

Isolated and displaced, Somayeh cried out to God: "Why has this happened?" Suddenly, to her surprise, she felt God say, "I want to build a church here in this town."

It was an impossible idea. But she set out. And, starting with a handful of Christians meeting in secret, it soon grew to an underground house church with more than 30 members.

"When we gathered, we never mentioned our meeting places over the phone – we used code words and were extremely careful," Somayeh says. "All phones had to be turned off, and we even removed the batteries to avoid tracking. "We saw miracles happening with us, and with people around us! Seeing the church grow was one of the greatest joys of my life." Then, one day, the intelligence services called with a chilling message: "We will see you soon."

Time to go.

Sustained By God

Today, Somayeh and her daughter live in another country. She had to flee, leaving everything behind, even her son due to his military service. "It's difficult knowing he's still there," she shares, "but even when hope feels delayed, I know God is working. His love sustains us, and His guidance strengthens me every day."

She has found a Persian speaking church where she can worship freely and, helped and trained by Open Doors partners, she serves secret Christians in Iran through an online ministry.

"I am truly grateful to those who support these seminars and make them possible," she says.

"Thank you."

Iran - Did you know? Christians who convert from Islam are viewed as a threat. While historic minorities like Armenian and Assyrian Christians have some protection, they are not allowed to worship in Persian or interact with converts from Islam

Tearfund has been helping them start again.

Three years ago, at age 33, Faridatou* was living peacefully with her husband and five children (two sons and three daughters) on their land in Burkina Faso. The couple supported themselves and their children by farming. The family was self-sufficient. They managed to provide all that they needed through their work. And then, abruptly and terrifyingly, everything changed in the matter of a few hours.

A context of conflict in Burkina Faso

Burkina Faso has been struggling with conflict since 2016. In the first half of 2024 alone (up to August), it's estimated that around 6,000 civilians in the country died in conflict-related violence. By that point, the eight years of violence had already forced more than 2.3 million people to flee their homes.

In 2022, it was Faridatou's family's turn to run.

Devastating attacks on their commune destroyed houses, belongings and farmlands. Along with their neighbours, they were forced to abandon everything they knew, leaving their homes and livelihoods behind to seek safety in another part of the country. Faridatou, her husband and their five children arrived in a new community without any material possessions. The life they had known had been shattered. In an instant, they had been flung from their stable way of life into a precarious and vulnerable position.

Struggling for food, work and education

With no source of income, they struggled to pay for even their most basic needs. And, to add to their challenges, their 16-year-old would have to walk almost four miles to reach the nearest school.

Recognising that such a long journey each morning and afternoon was not good for their son's wellbeing or academic performance, the family made

the difficult decision to send him away to live with a family living closer to the school. This separation, though necessary, added to the emotional strain on the family.

Faridatou's husband diligently sought out any available work he could get to try to provide for the family's needs, but the opportunities were few and far between and despite his best efforts, they lived in a constant state of hardship and uncertainty.

Determined to contribute to the family's survival and help improve their circumstances, Faridatou started doing some market gardening**. This work, though demanding, offered them some practical hope.

Opportunities and sheep

Then, things improved even more. As part of a local Tearfund partner project called Food for the Body and Soul, Faridatou was offered the opportunity to train in an income-generating activity of her choice. She chose livestock breeding. Once she had completed the training, which included input on business management and management tools, she also received a ram and a breeding kit, livestock feed, a manger and a water trough.

A few months later, she was able to sell the ram and afford to buy a bicycle for her son so he could come home and still get to school easily without having to live away from the family!

Faridatou also bought a couple of sheep to breed and she happily explains, 'I now have three sheep as one of them bore a lamb. 'I am confident that this work will expand and will help to bring my family relief.'

Food for the Body and Soul: a food and nutritional resilience project

Now in its third year of implementation, the *Food for the Body and Soul* project in Burkina Faso includes activities designed to: support households struggling to access sufficient food and nutrition; improve relationships within households and communities through peacebuilding

activities and promote positive gender norms using Tearfund's Transforming Masculinities approach.

As part of this project:

- 121 people (105 women and 16 men) have been trained in effective farming techniques, the use of simplified management tools and the development of marketing strategies;
- 36 young people (13 boys and 23 girls) and 75 women have been able to create an income-generating activity and improve their finances;
- 12 gender champions have been trained to conduct Transforming Masculinities dialogues;
- 26 community leaders (21 men and five women) have been envisioned on the Transforming Masculinities approach;
- 62 couples have attended Transforming Masculinities community dialogues so far; and
- 109 children (75 girls and 34 boys) identified as malnourished have been restored to health after training provided to their mothers helped them produce nutritious meals.

**What is market gardening?

Market gardening is small-scale farming that focuses on growing a variety of produce (fruits, vegetables and flowers) to sell. It is associated with manual labour as opposed to using farming machinery.

Imagine if your community had no roads and little access to the outside world. How would you or your family reach a doctor if you were sick or injured? How would you receive an education or access job opportunities? This is the reality for millions of people.

Jungles, mountains, swamps, insecurity and dilapidated infrastructure are all barriers to receiving physical and spiritual care and a hope for the future.

Why we fly

We are Mission Aviation Fellowship – or MAF – a Christian mission organisation that uses planes to overcome these barriers. Our pilots and personnel deliver relief workers, doctors, pastors, school books, food, medicines – everything that can only be safely and speedily transported by air. Our supporters give and pray to make this all possible. With an MAF plane taking off or landing every six minutes, the need is huge. Will you partner with us?

SAMUEL'S CANCER JOURNEY

On an otherwise ordinary day, a father – Nicholas – noticed that his son – Samuel – had a very swollen mouth.

As soon as it could be arranged, the 12-year-old boy was driven from his home in Enairebuk, Kenya, to a hospital in Narok where he was diagnosed with a rare form of cancer.

That's a four-hour road journey.

Due to the shocking nature of Samuel's cancer, he was referred by doctors in Narok to the specialists at Nakuru Hospital.

That's another three hours further north.

The long, arduous journey was worth it. Genuine progress was being made. Samuel and his entire family felt relieved. The future looked far brighter than it had done since the initial cancer diagnosis.

Then the doctors in Kenya went on strike.

Samuel was quickly admitted to a private hospital in the capital Nairobi. Patiently, he endured 36 sessions of radiotherapy.

The new journey also takes seven hours

It was at this point in the story that MAF started to put the smile back on Samuel's face. And an indescribable feeling in his dad's heart.

Christian organisation Red Tribe, who work with Kenyan communities on a variety of health and education projects, heard about Samuel's plight. They called us immediately.

Samuel and Nicholas were flown to Nairobi. They were spared the physical and mental exhaustion of the horrendous road journeys they had shared for so long.

Bravely, Samuel suffered 12 sessions of chemotherapy.

He's determined to live.

MAF PILOT'S EXPERIENCE

I wanted to share a remarkable experience I recently had while piloting for MAF to the remote area of Loglogo in northern Kenya.

I had the privilege of transporting a team from Water Matters Sweden to deliver water filters to communities in dire need, especially in places where clean water is scarce and often unsafe to drink.

When we touched down in Loglogo, we were greeted by Meshack Gayere a dedicated health officer from Marsabit. His warm welcome reminded me once again why we do what we do. Meshack spoke with such heartfelt appreciation, saying,

'These water filters are a lifeline for our community. They don't just provide clean water, they bring hope, health and the promise of a better future.'

In northern Kenya, access to clean water is a daily struggle and water sources are often contaminated. The risk of waterborne diseases like cholera is ever-present, and the people here have endured several outbreaks due to the scarcity of safe drinking water.

The situation is made worse by conflicts over these limited water sources and the worsening effects of climate change.

But on that day in Loglogo – after I'd taken off – something extraordinary happened. As the team demonstrated how to use the water filters, the

villagers watched in awe as murky, dirty water was transformed into crystal-clear, drinkable water.

The look of sheer joy and relief on their faces was something the team told me they'd never forget. Many of them called the team 'angels sent from heaven,' and they could see in the people's eyes just how much these simple devices meant to them.

Marcus from Water Matters Sweden, who led the team, expressed what we were all feeling: 'MAF's commitment to reaching the most remote locations makes all the difference. Together, we're not just delivering filters; we're delivering life.'

YOU BRING LIFE

It is early spring.

A man is taking a short cut home to his family, after shopping for flour. His stroll takes him along the riverbank. Suddenly, he is set upon by men armed with knives who take his shopping, his phone and his money before stabbing him three times. He is left for dead, shouting desperately for help.

You won't read this news story in your newspaper or see it on your television. It happened in remote Papua New Guinea (PNG)... invisible to the world's 'media'.

Had this atrocious act happened here, an ambulance would have been mere minutes away. In remote PNG, the wounded man was just minutes from death.

Amazingly, a Baptist pastor happened to be walking along the riverbank. When he saw the dying man he phoned immediately for help.

MAF flew to the rescue. Because of the MAF family, that man is alive.

His name is John and his message is this: 'I was a dead man, but you saved my life'
