



During the early weeks of February we see many of our shops full of red hearts enticing us to buy cards and gifts to declare our love for that one special person. Maybe it's a bit of over-commercialised fun, but everyone wants, and probably needs, to feel loved.

You're probably aware of the different types of love, which take their names from Greek. We have STORGE which is family love, PHILIA which is the love between good friends, and EROS which is romantic love. But the one I'm focusing on today however is AGAPE. Agape love isn't so much about how you feel about a person but how you treat them. Agape love is the unconditional, unmerited, selfless and sacrificial love that we read of in the Bible. It is the love that God gives; it's the love we read of in 1 Corinthians 13. It's the love we see in probably the most famous verse in the whole Bible:

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

(John 3:16)

Love is spoken about so much in the Bible. We are commanded to love one another, to love our enemies, to love those who persecute us... that's a big ask!! And that is one of the big differences with agape love. It is a love that values, respects, and honours another person because of their intrinsic value and worth rather than being based on their behaviour, attitudes or attributes. And it's not necessarily reciprocated - it is not based on whether they like you or not. Agape love is a choice, and it requires effort.

Whilst many of us are blessed with loving families, that does not go for everyone. Many of us have loving friends, but many others - even within churches - don't. Yet we all, undeserving as we are, have equal access to vast unconditional love from our living and loving God. Why would we not want to share that love with others?

As winter gives way to spring - a season of buds and new shoots - look for ways of growing in God's love for each one of us, and search too for ways of sharing His love with others.

ELECTION OF CHURCH OFFICERS AND DEACONS 2026

At the Church Meeting on 19th March there will be an election to fill vacancies for church officers and deacons. Nominations for these vacancies will open on Sunday, 8th February and close on Sunday, 1st March, and profiles of those nominated will be displayed on church noticeboards as soon after that as possible.

Nomination forms will be available from Sunday, 8th February.

There will be three Officer vacancies:-

- Treasurer: Barbara Williams is eligible to be re-elected if nominated and wishes to stand.
- Church Secretary: this position is currently vacant.
- Assistant Church Secretary: this position continues to be vacant.

There will be 5 Deacon vacancies:

- Neil Sherry has completed one three-year term as a Deacon and is therefore able to stand for another term if nominated and he wishes to stand.
- Nic Weller has completed one three-year term as a Deacon and is therefore able to stand for another term if nominated and she wishes to stand.
- Anne Swannell has completed two terms of three years and is therefore not eligible to stand for re-election.
- Gwyneth Tozer is standing down as a deacon.
- The other vacancy has remained unfilled from previous years.

The maximum number of church Trustees given in our Constitution is 12, plus our Senior Minister.

Continuing Trustees will be:

Senior Minister (Rev. Nigel Riley), and 4 deacons (David Atilola, Keith Burgess-Clements, Rachel Flemons, Dhan Kumari Rai).

We ask all members to consider prayerfully each of the vacancies, who they might wish to nominate to stand for election from within the fellowship and also whether they themselves are being called to the privilege of serving God and the fellowship in this way. For anyone wishing to find out more about the roles of being an Officer or Deacon, please contact Nigel or speak with any incumbent of the post who will be happy to answer questions you may have or to talk you through the roles and responsibilities. This is an opportunity to be part of the Church Leadership Team.

Our Church Rules state that to be nominated for any of these vacancies, you need to have been in membership of the church for a year, i.e. since March 2025. New Deacons and Officers take up their roles after the May AGM on Thursday, 21st May 2026.

A form to request a postal vote, should you be unable to attend on 19th March, can be obtained from the church office from Sunday, 15th February and returned no later than Sunday, 1st March.



AMAZING GRACE

Encounter God's saving mercy through Htoo Lee's story of coming to faith in Thailand.

What if your son's reckless behaviour landed you with a fine that you couldn't afford? If his drug taking wound him up in jail? If his downward spiral was dragging his brother down with him? What would you do? Probably not organise a worship evening to cover your child in prayer.

Sarah Brown, a BMS World Mission worker based in northern Thailand, recalls the moment her eyes welled up with tears of joy during an English class at Siloam Bible Institute (SBI). Her student, Htoo Lee, had just shared his testimony, in clearly articulated English, of the events that brought him to faith. The class had been discussing the salvation of Shadrach, Meshach

and Abednego from the fiery furnace, leading Sarah to ask, “What miracles has God done in your life?” Little did she expect the deeply honest, vulnerable answer she received.

Just two years earlier, Htoo Lee was as far away from a seminary classroom as he could be. Disobedient, sad and fearful, he spent his days hanging around with friends who looked on at life with the same disillusioned anger. There were just two things that helped him calm down: drugs and alcohol. “He didn’t want to listen to his parents; he didn’t want to listen to anyone,” explains Sarah. “That’s how his life went into a downward spiral.”

Htoo Lee used to sell tomatoes in his local village. One day, he and his brother were transporting their wares via bicycle when they were stopped by the police. It was immediately clear to the officers that the boys needed to take a drugs test. “Htoo Lee knew exactly what result it was going to come back with,” adds Sarah, “and that those results were going to be positive.”

The test landed Htoo Lee in prison for two nights, with his brother locked up beside him. Because Htoo Lee had been riding his bike under the influence, the police also gave him a fine. It was money he didn’t have, and his parents couldn’t afford it either.

When Htoo Lee’s parents received news of his arrest, it sat heavily with them. Punishing him would have been just. But Htoo Lee’s parents, both Christians, decided that upon his release, they would pray with him instead. In fact, that same night when the brothers came out of prison, they decided to hold a prayer and worship evening.

It was during the prayer and worship night that Htoo Lee felt a new sensation. It was peace. A family member gently asked him if he wanted to give his life to Christ, and, without hesitation, he said “yes”. “He realised within a matter of weeks that God was calling him to go to Bible school,” Sarah explains. The first Bible school he applied to invited him to

interview, and Htoo Lee felt he needed to be open and honest about his past life. “The seminary said no,” explains Sarah. “They didn’t accept him.”

Htoo Lee was disheartened but not broken. Coming back home, he spoke to a trusted teacher, who recommended he apply to Siloam Bible Institute. In the interview, Htoo Lee trusted the same sense that told him he should be honest about his past. Immediately after speaking, he dropped his head, preparing to hear the news: ‘Not accepted’.

It was in that moment that the Christians around Htoo Lee once again chose to embody mercy. Ajarn Glad, the head of SBI, told Htoo Lee, “It’s okay. Christ has forgiven you and you have been transformed by him. You have changed”. At that point, Htoo Lee realised the seminary had identified the miracle, the transformation and the work that Christ had done in his life.

Htoo Lee has hopes in the future to go on to become an evangelist. He is in the very early stages of a BA Theology programme, but he hopes he’ll be able to go back to his village to share the good news, and to bring many others to Christ.

PRAY TODAY FOR JOY THAT MAKES YOUR HEART SING

My name is Nicky Crampton and I am part of the Partnerships Team at Tearfund. Can you think of a moment when you experienced such joy that you thought your heart might burst? I'd like to tell you today about a time that I experienced utter joy raining in a church in Rwanda. And that's not a spelling mistake – I really mean raining!

The small rural church in Huye, Rwanda, sits off the main road looking a little rundown. But in the space of just two years, this unassuming church has been the centre of transformation in the community – people have been lifted out of poverty, broken relationships have been restored, lives changed forever.

How? By vision, determination, desperation and some training.

Desperation rather than Hope

For years, Pastor François lived in poverty and faithfully led this struggling church. The regular offerings came to 900 Rwandan Francs a month – that's about £1. Can you imagine trying to be a leader and pastor when you can't even provide for your own family? In desperation rather than hope he signed up to Tearfund's Transforming Communities programme.

Pastor François took part in the training and then led his church through a series of Bible studies. They learnt about being loved, being made in the image of God, being salt and light, being enough as they are.

They learnt to recognise what skills and resources they already had in their own hands. God's word taught them to love and value each other – healing relationships. No handouts, no top down plan. People were simply released by the power of God's word to be who they really are – finding their identity in Jesus.

Two years on, this church of 50 people now has a congregation of 1,450.

A community transformed

Why and how did this happen? As they discussed their problems they realised what they most needed were sustainable livelihoods and access to healthcare. Tearfund's training provided them with a self-help group model of community saving. They began community pig farming. By starting small, they were then able to breed pigs, sell them on, and also give them away to other members of the self-help group. They were able to pay for their own healthcare and they then started to identify members of their church in vulnerable situations who they could help with healthcare costs too.

Pastor François also went out into the community and invited people to his church. He had something exciting to offer – the transforming love of Jesus. This changed the lives of people like Innocent, a young man and father of seven children, who was sleeping in a damp, cold tent with his family. He began to come to church, started a business, and the church members built him a house. The church is now at the stage where every member of the congregation can pay healthcare costs. They are also paying the health insurance of community members in need who are not part of the church. This includes helping families in vulnerable situations to send their children to school by providing uniforms and materials.

With people travelling far and wide to come along to church, they have now planted two more churches across the parish.

Prioritising people

Pastor François explained to us that the transformation has been so complete that the church offering was now around 250,000 Rwandan Francs a month – almost £200. From this he receives a small salary to support his own family. The rest is being used to support the mission of the church to reach out into their community. What I really love is that they were prioritising people over the church building itself, which was in need of serious renovation, although they were improving it gradually.

As I sat in that rickety, tin-roofed church and these remarkable, ordinary people told their stories, I was in awe. Their trust, open-hearted, full-throttle generosity was allowing God to flow through everything. The transforming power of God was palpable.

As we sat together, the weather turned and rain began dripping in through parts of the roof. The main problem with this was that I could no longer hear the stories because of the noise. Pastor François was visibly embarrassed and uncomfortable about this. But the congregation took over and started to use the rhythm of the rain to sing and dance and we all praised Jesus together. The joy of the Lord was literally raining in that place.


Author CS Lewis says, ‘Joy is the serious business of heaven.’ Let’s be people who, with Jesus, look for the light, see the good, find the hope and bring the joy.

If it’s raining today, take a moment to watch it or listen to it on a roof. (If it happens to be a dry day, you can find rain-sound playlists online.) Picture the rain coming through the church roof in Rwanda and the joy that filled that place. Ask God to rain joy on you, on your family, on your community.

Please pray for the 62,000 churches around the world that Tearfund is currently working with. Pray they will continue to be centres of transformation in their communities. Tearfund has an ambition to be working with 250,000 churches by 2030 – please pray that God paves the way for that to happen and brings growth in the coming year.

PLEASE PRAY FOR IRANIAN CHRISTIANS AS AUTHORITIES CRACK DOWN

I am Barnabas Aid's Projects Manager for Central Asia and Iran. Iran is currently engulfed in its largest nationwide uprising since 1979, and our brothers and sisters are caught in the crossfire. Since 28th December 2025, a collapsing economy and 70% food inflation have driven millions into the streets across all 31 provinces. The authorities have responded with an unprecedented level of brutality.

Christians scapegoated

On 8th January, a near-total nationwide internet blackout was imposed — a “digital darkness” used specifically to hide a violent crackdown from the eyes of the world.

“The authorities have labelled peaceful protesters as ‘enemies of God’ and ‘foreign mercenaries’ to justify mass slaughter,” said an Iranian Christian. “In this atmosphere of paranoia, the Iranian government is using the Christian minority as a strategic scapegoat,” he continued. “By linking house churches to the ‘economic riots’ they seek to frame the uprising as a conspiracy of foreign interference.”

Despite the internet blockages (see below), Barnabas Aid has received some harrowing direct reports from our partners inside the country.

- Violence in the streets: Partners report that gunfire has been constant throughout the night for the past several days. The killings have intensified, and the true casualty count is far higher than official numbers.
- Mass disappearances: In Mashhad, we have received reports of more than 55 missing church members.

- Confirmed deaths: At least 11 church members have been confirmed killed in Fasa, Fars Province.
- Mobilised mercy: In an incredible display of the Gospel in action, “house churches” have mobilised to provide medical care to the wounded, as they often fear “disappearance” if they seek help at state-controlled hospitals.

Systematically silenced

We must share with you that our ability to receive news is becoming nearly impossible. The authorities have implemented a sophisticated, multi-layered protocol where only state-approved institutions can access the web. Iran is effectively severed from the global community. We have had almost no communication for days; however, within the past 24 hours, we managed to receive a few brief, frantic calls from partners using short-wave radio and illegal satellite links.

These calls were short and plagued by interference, but the message was clear: the situation is far more dire than the occasional leaked video suggests. These few minutes of contact are our only window into a nation being systematically silenced

The situation is critical. We humbly ask you to stand in prayer with the Iranian Church. Please share this report with your church and small groups. The authorities rely on the world looking away; our attention provides a measure of protection.

How you can pray

Please pray for those who have been bereaved and for those whose family members and friends are either arrested or otherwise missing. Intercede for those being held by the authorities, asking that the Lord will sustain them in their time of severe trial. Ask for a resolution to Iran’s economic and political difficulties that leads to greater peace and prosperity for our brothers and sisters in Christ, and for all the people of Iran. Pray that the light of Christ will shine through the darkness.
